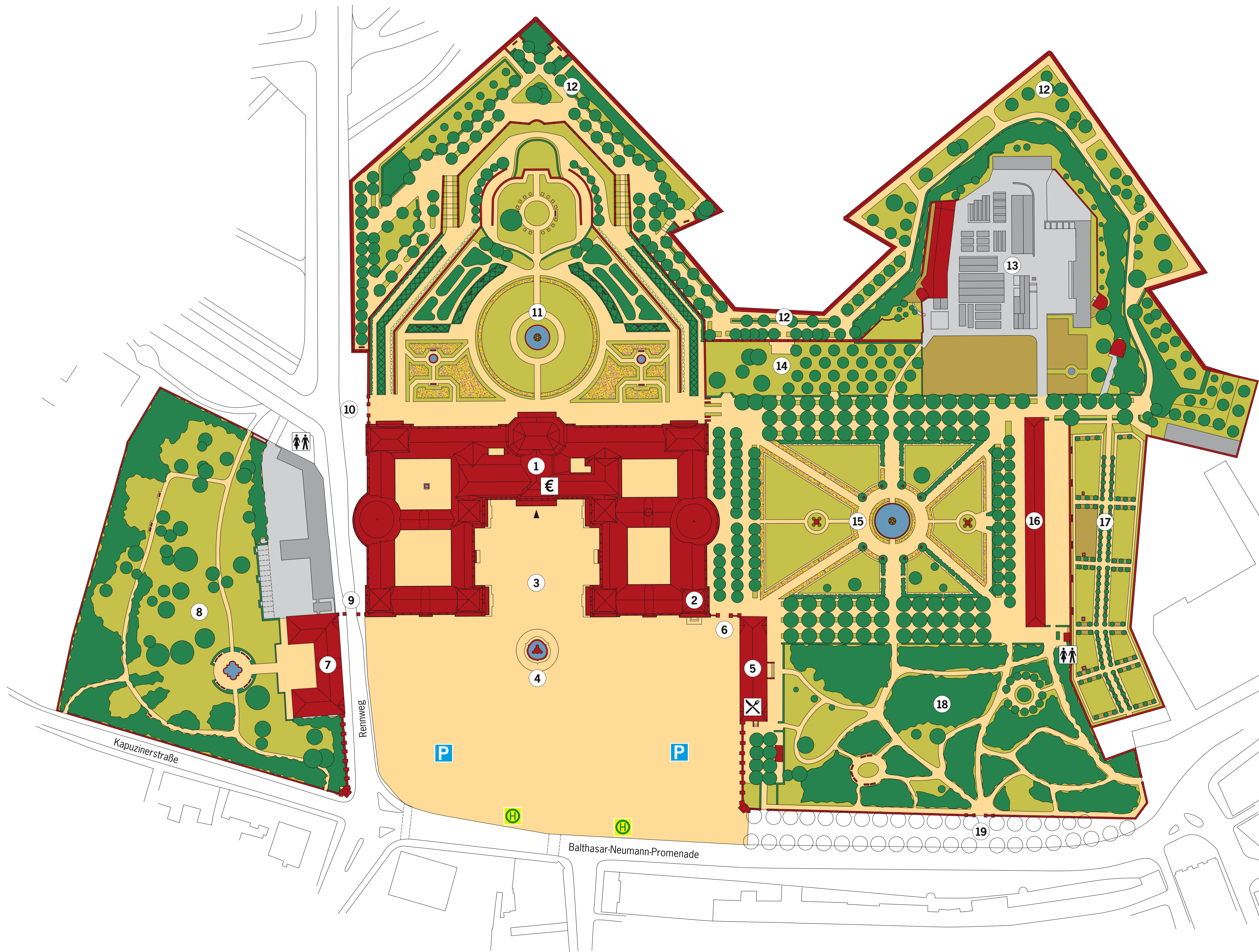




Würzburg Court Garden



- ① **Würzburg Residence** (built 1720–44: interior decoration and original furnishing completed c. 1780)
 - ② **Court Chapel** (1735–43)
 - ③ **Residence Square** with cour d'honneur
 - ④ **Franconia Fountain** (Ferdinand v. Miller, 1894)
 - ⑤ **Ambassadorial Building** (1767, today a restaurant) with arcades and high column (1765–71)
 - ⑥ **Court Garden Gate** by the Ambassadorial Building (Georg and Anton Oegg, 1748–74)
 - ⑦ **Rosenbachhof** (c. 1700) with arcades and high column (1768–74), today the state wine cellar (Staatlicher Hofkeller)
 - ⑧ **Rosenbach Park** (redesigned in 1962)
 - ⑨ **Wrought-iron gate**, so-called »Rennweg Gate« (Georg Oegg, 1751–67)
 - ⑩ **North Court Garden Gate**, so-called »Greiffenclau Gate« (1751/52)
 - ⑪ **East garden** (from 1770): parterre sections with lawns and flowerbeds, water basin, rose beds, side pergolas made of larch and cornelian cherry trees and sculptures (1771–77), on the lower ramps pergolas made of mulberry trees
 - ⑫ **Promenade** on the former bastions, balustrade with cast sculptures by Johann Peter Wagner (1771–77, copies)
 - ⑬ **Nursery**: historical glasshouse, modern glasshouses, workshops and areas for outdoor cultivation – not accessible
 - ⑭ **Lime Tree Gallery** with an open area for musical performances
 - ⑮ **South garden** (from 1756): parterre sections with water basin, lawns, flowerbeds, cone-shaped yew trees (planted c. 1900), with cast sculptures by Johann Peter Wagner (1771–77, copies), avenues of trees along the sides and three rows of ornamental cherry trees in front of the south façade of the Residence
 - ⑯ **Orangery** (1756–58, reconstructed)
 - ⑰ **Kitchen garden** (1804): reconstructed and newly planted 1998–2005
 - ⑱ **Landscape garden section** (c. 1793): trees and shrubs, lawns and circle of yew trees
 - ⑲ **Court Garden Gate** on the Court Promenade (Georg Oegg, 1748–66)
